YOUR DONATIONS HELP FUND SUSTAINABILITY

Twinning donations help Lwanga ministries fund everyday costs to educate students, such as tuition, books and other supplies, and other needs, like food, water and renovations. Ministries also use donations for special projects, including those that can support self-sufficiency, like starting Mount La Salle's bakery.

Principal Brother Godwin Biin, FSC, decided on a bakery by "purposefully and carefully making sure that the twinning financial assistance we got was channeled toward school development, and a viable self-sufficiency project has created a positive and lasting impact that is alleviating some of the consequences of poverty."



THE GOAL

Mount La Salle College wanted to use twinning donations in a way that would benefit the students and community and generate income to help the school meet its needs.



THE APPROACH

Twinning donations provided the much-needed funds to start the bakery. From there, the school used its own funding to grow the bakery, such as adding a mixer and staff members.



THE IMPACT

Proceeds from the bakery have helped Mount La Salle fund several projects at school. The bakery has also provided high-quality bread to students and the community.

Mount La Salle College has used previous donations to renovate the administrative block and renovate an old building to convert it into a medical clinic for students.

BENEFITS OF THE BAKERY

The bakery provides high-quality bread for students, which means the school no longer needs to purchase low-quality bread for meals. With the money saved from baking bread on campus and the money earned from bread sales, Mount La Salle has been able to accomplish a number of goals:

- Installing four metal doors on the girls' dormitories
- Buying protective metal coverings for the doors and windows of its cafeteria, which is under construction
- Building a fence near the main gate of the school and adding metal bars to it
- Providing free bread to teachers during workshops or conferences at school
- Creating jobs for seven people who work in the bakery

Most importantly, the bakery gives the school an opportunity to become more self-sufficient.



LOOKING TO THE FUTURE

Mount La Salle College continues to plan for projects that will increase the school's ability to be self-sufficient, while improving educational opportunities for students. Brother Godwin hopes to use future twinning donations to help establish an animal husbandry project that could bring income to the school and promote agricultural educational activities for students. His vision is for the program to include pigs, goats, a fish pond, rabbits and poultry for eggs.
